*The first reading*

A reading from the Book of Exodus. (*Exodus 20:1-17*)

Then God spoke all these words: I am the Lord your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery; you shall have no other gods before me. You shall not make for yourself an idol, whether in the form of anything that is in heaven above, or that is on the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth. You shall not bow down to them or worship them; for I the Lord your God am a jealous God, punishing children for the iniquity of parents, to the third and the fourth generation of those who reject me, but showing steadfast love to the thousandth generation of those who love me and keep my commandments.

You shall not make wrongful use of the name of the Lord your God, for the Lord will not acquit anyone who misuses his name. Remember the sabbath day, and keep it holy. Six days you shall labour and do all your work. But the seventh day is a sabbath to the Lord your God; you shall not do any work—you, your son or your daughter, your male or female slave, your livestock, or the alien resident in your towns. For in six days the Lord made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them, but rested the seventh day; therefore the Lord blessed the sabbath day and consecrated it.

Honour your father and your mother, so that your days may be long in the land that the Lord your God is giving you. You shall not murder. You shall not commit adultery. You shall not steal. You shall not bear false witness against your neighbour. You shall not covet your neighbour's house; you shall not covet your neighbour's wife, or male or female slave, or ox, or donkey, or anything that belongs to your neighbour.

A Reading from the Holy Gospel according to John (*John 2:13-22*)  
**Glory to you, Lord.**

The Passover of the Jews was near, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem. In the temple he found people selling cattle, sheep, and doves, and the money changers seated at their tables. Making a whip of cords, he drove all of them out of the temple, both the sheep and the cattle. He also poured out the coins of the money changers and overturned their tables. He told those who were selling the doves, "Take these things out of here! Stop making my Father's house a marketplace!" His disciples remembered that it was written, "Zeal for your house will consume me." The Jews then said to him, "What sign can you show us for doing this?" Jesus answered them, "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up." The Jews then said, "This temple has been under construction for forty-six years, and will you raise it up in three days?" But he was speaking of the temple of his body. After he was raised from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this; and they believed the scripture and the word that Jesus had spoken.

*The Sermon.*

*After which we remain silent.*

*We affirm our faith together:*

**Though he was divine, he did not cling to equality with God, but made himself nothing. Taking the form of a slave, he was born in human likeness. He humbled himself and was obedient to death, even the death of the cross. Therefore God has raised him on high, and given him the name above every name: that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, and every voice proclaim that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father. Amen.**

*Our intercessions end with:*

**Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee. Blessed art thou among women and blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus. Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners now and at the hour of our death. Amen.**

*We share the Peace of Christ.*

He will not hold us in condemnation, nor stand in power over the weak, he will become a slave, take our hate into his heart and win us with forgiveness.

The peace of the Lord be always with you!

*We offer each other a sign of peace.*

*The Cantor sings the Offertory Hymn*

*Eternal Ruler of the ceaseless round  
of circling planets singing on their way;  
guide of the nations from the night profound  
into the glory of the perfect day;  
rule in our hearts, that we may ever be  
guided and strengthened and upheld by thee.*

*We would be one in hatred of all wrong,  
one in our love of all things sweet and fair,  
one with the joy that breaketh into song,  
one with the grief that trembles into prayer,  
one in the power that makes thy children free  
to follow truth, and thus to follow thee.*

*When all is ready, we remain standing and come to solemn prayer:*

The Lord be with you.

Lift up your hearts.

*We lift them to the Lord.*

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God

*It is right to give thanks and praise.*

We thank you, desert Mother, for in the valley of dry bones you create hearts of flesh quickened by the Spirit's breath. We thank you, wise Sister, that you walk in cloud and fire with your lost and faithless people. We thank you Son of Heaven, that you empty yourself of might and glory and set your face towards the fickle crowd, the cruel empire, the faithful despisers. We welcome you as God's own fool, whose cross brings to nothing the violence of the world and reveals another wisdom outside the city walls. Therefore, with all who follow your way, with the traders and tax collectors, the soldiers and prostitutes, and all who caught a glimpse of glory in the humanity you shared, we worship God's own holiness revealed in sweat and tears:

*Holy, holy, holy Lord God of power and might,*

*Heaven and earth are full of your glory*

*Hosanna in the highest.*

*Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.*

*Hosanna, in the highest. Hosanna, in the highest.*

We ask that your Holy Spirit will fall upon us and upon these gifts that these fragile, earthly things may be to us the body and blood of our Lord and brother, Jesus Christ; who, on the night that he was betrayed, gathered with his faltering friends for a meal that tasted of freedom.

Calling them to his table, he took bread, gave thanks, broke it and said: 'This is my body, which is given for you. Do this to remember me.' +

In the same way after supper, he took the cup, saying: 'This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, whenever you drink it, to remember me.' As on that night, so here and now he offers himself in touch and taste beyond all words can hold. +

Therefore, in our eating and drinking we are filled with the life-giving presence of Christ; we proclaim him as creation's host, transforming poverty into plenty in the reckless generosity of love. Inspire us with the hope that one day death and greed will be no more and people without number will come from east and west, north and south to share the kingdom meal.

We ask this through Jesus Christ our Lord.

*Blessing and honour and glory and power  
be yours for ever and ever. Amen.*

As our Saviour taught so we pray:

**Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us and lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory forever and ever. Amen.**

We break this bread to share in the body of Christ.

**Though we are many we are one body,  
because we all share in one bread.**

*If you have your own bread and wine or food and drink as we celebrate this Eucharist together: Receive what you are, the Body of Christ.*

*The Cantor sings the Agnus Dei*

*Jesus,  
Lamb of God,  
have mercy on us.*

*Jesus,  
bearer of our sins,  
have mercy on us.*

*Jesus,  
redeemer of the world,  
grant us peace.*

*Once Communion has been distributed, we pray:*

**Lord of the feast beyond measure and price; we thank you for meeting us in our brokenness so that none might be lost: liberate us now to share bread with our neighbour, each receiving from the other what we need to be ourselves. Amen.**

*We say together the Ohana prayer:*

**Loving God  
transform all blocks and obstacles around us  
and inside our minds,  
bodies and hearts,  
into pathways for your grace –  
that we may be channels for your love  
and peace in this place.  
Embolden us with courage to dare to dream  
of a better life  
in which *ALL* may flourish.  
Break our hearts open  
so no one gets forgotten  
or left behind  
In Jesus name  
Amen.**

*We stand for the Blessing:*

God be with you.  
**And also with you.**

May the crucified Christ shatter our brittle fear, draw all hope to his glory and make us servants living for the world; and the blessing of God, Creator, Redeemer and Sustainer be with us this day and always. **Amen.**

The mass is ended, go in peace to love and serve the Lord.  
**In the name of Christ. Amen.**
